OSTP Issues Guidance to Make Federally Funded Research Freely Available Without Delay

U.S. policy guidance to make the results of taxpayer-supported research immediately available to the American public at no cost.

DOE Public Access Plan

- All DOE-funded research are subject to Data Management and Sharing Plans (DMSP)
- DMSP will address validation and replication of results, timely and equitable access, data repository selection, data management resources, and data sharing limitations.
- Reviewers of Office of Science research proposals evaluate DMSP

• Openness in science part of our core values

ERKELEY LAB

- Global impact of the Lab:
 - \$1.02 billion budget
 - 1,800 researchers
 - 14,000 researchers worldwide use our research facilities
- Research Data Policy since 2022:
 - Mandates DMSP
 - Encourages sharing of research data via FAIR Principles
 - Data ownership and processes when researchers leave LBNL
 - Establishes RIO as point of contact regarding data sharing concerns

Who owns the data?

- Data is typically owned by the institution
- PI are the stewards of that data, with authority to make decisions
 - > Institutions are part of the dialogue around research data
 - > Institutions also have responsibilities for data

Data Issues: Authorship & Contribution Conflicts

- Journals have established processes for research integrity & conflicts
- What about data publishers?
- Author lists of data sets can be different than author lists on related journal article
- Datasets can have many more contributors (e.g. citizen science)
- Author lists should be changeable (e.g. name changes, dispute resolutions)
- Coordination needed if conflicts impact different research outputs
- No formal dispute process may exist outside of institutions
- Do institutions have processes in place?

Data Issues: Legal & Regulatory Concerns

- What if there are legal or regulatory concerns about data sets?
 - Copyright concerns (including generative AI!)
 - Local legal restrictions
 - Privacy and ethics concerns (participants in human subjects research)
 - Sensitive subjects (e.g. hate speech as research topic)
 - Problematic data origin (e.g. data arising from surveillance practices)
 - Sensitive data (location of endangered species)
 - Dual Use Research of Concern, research security
- Data publishers responsible to address concerns
- Needs involvement of authors, institutions if necessary

Data Issues: Research Ethics and Integrity Concerns

- Fabrication, Falsification and Plagiarism (naturally) impact research data sets
- Datasets usually relate to investigations by institutions, funders, journals
- Institutions need to consider data outputs in addition to journal articles in correcting the scholarly record
- Processes for data removals/replacements, or retraction?
- > Who has responsibility?
- Consider where you deposit your data!



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Questions for institutions

Open Research and Research Ethics

- There are an increased number of stakeholders for research outputs
- Data sharing can lead to inadvertent releases of sensitive data
- Access controls can mitigate privacy and other concerns
- Research ethics and integrity issues need to be addressed for all research outputs

The role of institutions

- Ensure all research outputs are considered when addressing ethics concerns
- Who has responsibility to resolve concerns arising from data sets?
- How are conflicts resolved? Do authorship guidelines cover data sets?
- Is it clear to all parties whom to contact at institutions?
- Do researchers have sufficient guidance?

LBNL Research Data Policy – Contacts Section

- Questions around the use, management, and sharing of research data should be directed to the relevant PI or to the applicable research division, data repository, or facility.

The RIO may discuss concerns informally, which may include discussing them anonymously and/or hypothetically. If the circumstances described by an individual do not suggest research policy violations, the RIO will refer the matter to other offices or officials with responsibility for resolving a concern.
